January for a Reflection

As we come towards the end of the year 2022 and look forward to the New Year 2023, it is good to take a clue from the name of the first month of the year for our reflection. The name 'January' in the Roman Calendar, it is said, comes from the Roman god by name 'Janus'. Every god among the several gods has some specific role and characteristic. Accordingly, god Janus is said to have had two faces — one in front as many of us have it and another at the back. From this point of view the name 'January' is an apt name for the first month of the new year. It is fitting because this month is partly a time to look back into the past (year) and partly to look ahead!

Peter Pappu SJ emphasized on spiritual life, good life and responsibilities etc. of these Widows and Widowers. Some of these participants became emotional as they shared how most of the time they are suppressed by others in the society. They are not considered as good persons. And they face many other challenges every day. This program strengthened and motivated them to stand firm against such unpleasant happenings. They asked for Holy Mass at least once a month separately for themselves. They thanked the Parish Priest for organizing this program. Finally, everyone was served delicious lunch.



2. Pre-Christmas Get-Together for the Village Catechists, *Panch*, *Mahila* and Youth Leaders

Pre-Christmas Get-Together for the Village Catechists, *Panch*, *Mahila* and Youth Leaders was celebrated on Dec. 18 in Gayaganga Parish. Around 200 leaders were present for the Holy Mass and gathering. Fr. Simon Kerketta SJ presided over the Holy Mass. Christmas Gathering started after the Mass. Each one brought a gift to give to his/her Christmas friend. They also did the carol singing. Fellowship meal was provided for them. Finally, Fr. Peter Pappu SJ addressed the group thanking them for their selfless service and support to the Church.

3. Distribution of Ration in the Parish

The Vincent De Paul Society of the Parish distributed ration to 130 poor families of the Parish including a few non-Christians. Three items (*Suji*, Sugar and oil) were distributed in the name of Christmas, so that all may enjoy this festive time having something at home.

BRBC-CRI-CDPI Annual MEETING at MATIGARA

The annual meeting of the Bengal Regional Bishops' Council (BRBC), Catholic Religious of India (CRI), Conference of Diocesan Priests of India (CDPI) of the West Bengal-Sikkim Region took place from 5th to 7th Dec 2022. This time, the diocese of Bagdogra hosted the annual meeting and the venue was 'Loyola Pastoral Centre, Matigara'. There were total 76 participants that included 7 regional bishops, Bishop Alwyn D'Silva (Auxiliary Bishop of Bombay archdiocese), the CBCI chairperson for ecology, and the major superiors and representatives of different religious congregations and the dioceses. The main theme of the meeting was: Ecological Conversion. The inaugural ceremony began at 10:30 am. Rt. Rev. Bishop Vincent Aind, the local ordinary, officially welcomed the participants to the diocese of Bagdogra and to this seminar.

The first session began at 3 pm. In his keynote address Rt. Rev. Alwyn D'Silva highlighted the theme and presented some facts and figures of ecological sin and stressed on the need of ecological conversion. The second resource person, Sr. Colette SJC, presented the climate scenario of Bengal and Sikkim. The third session was addressed jointly by Sr. Sabina Pathrose and Bro. Sunil Britto who separately spoke about ecological conversion and the cry of the mother earth.

Sr. Sabina and Br. Sunil continued on the second day and both elaborated the ideas of 'Laudato si' by Pope Francis. In the evening, there was a lively group discussion. Before ending the day we heard Dr. Pankaj Chaudhary on the "Culture of Compassion". He highlighted how in today's

family and society "palliative care" is the need of the hour.

The third day was kept for presentation of the reports from the region. The BRBC report was presented by Most. Rev. Thomas D'Souza. Rev. Fr. Vivien Andrew SJ presented the CRI report. Rev. Fr. Anup Mondol presented the CDPI (Bengal) report. Before going for the concluding Eucharistic celebration there took place the evaluation of the entire program. There was much appreciation from the participants and also some suggestions for conducting the program in a better way. The program ended with a vote of thanks by the regional executive committee. All these three days, the Holy Mass was celebrated in the parish church respectively by Bishop Vincent Aind, Archbishop Thomas D'Souza and Archbishop Leopoldo Girelli, the Nuncio. Krishnagar was proposed as the venue for the next annual meeting, but the theme is yet to be chosen.
